## WHAT IS MONTANA CAMPUS CORPS?

The Montana Campus Corps is an AmeriCorps program that engages college students in meeting critical community-identified needs. Campuses place students in hospitals, schools and nonprofits to mentor, teach, provide care for patients and more!

Montana Campus Corps members serve in leadership roles within their communities, and develop a deeper sense of civic responsibility in the process. Campus Corps members also strive to involve other students in community service by recruiting volunteers from among their peers.

## THE EDUCATION AWARD

Upon successful completion of a term of service, members are eligible to receive an Education Award to assist them in paying for college or repaying qualifying student loans. Education Awards range from \$1,000 to \$4,725, depending on the term of service.

## POSITIONS AVAILABLE

Several types of positions are available through the Campus Corps program. Students may serve as Campus Corps members in one of two ways: (1) as a paid, extracurricular community service placement or (2) as an unpaid internship or credit-bearing service activity that is already part of their course of study.

Depending on which type of service they commit to, Campus Corps members may choose a term of service that fits their needs and personal goals, with terms ranging from 300 to 900 service hours.

There are also full-time, 1700-hour Campus Corps Leader positions, designed for non-students. Leaders work to support student members during their service.

## BENEFITS OF SERVICE

In addition to the Education Award benefit, Campus Corps members may be eligible to receive a modest living allowance, Federal Work-Study award or academic credit during their term of service. Throughout their service, members receive training in citizenship and leadership skills, project management, volunteer recruitment and management, and discipline-specific training through their academic departments.

## EXAMPLES OF CAMPUS CORPS PROJECTS

- Coordinating the math, reading, and science tutoring programs for K-12 students and G.E.D. tutoring programs for community members and inmates
- Developing mentoring projects for middle and high school students to prevent drug abuse, teen pregnancy, and dropping out of school
- Coordinating safe and constructive after-school activities for Montana's at-risk youth
- Student Teaching, Nursing Clinicals, Radiology Clinicals, Social Work Practicum, Health Sciences Clinicals, (etc.) that are served with nonprofits and high-needs schools, and which address critical community needs
- Helping establish and working with established food banks to provide food for low-income families
- Serving with Habitat for Humanity chapters to increase affordable housing for low-income families
- Recruiting college student and community volunteers to assist with various national service days, such as Make a Difference Day and Martin Luther King, Jr., Day of Service
